**A BILL**

To authorize assistance to conduct military or paramilitary  
operations in Syria, and for other purposes.

1       *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*  
2       *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3       **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4       This Act may be cited as the “Congressional Ac-  
5       countability and Oversight in Syria Act”.

6       **SEC. 2. FINDINGS.**

7       Congress finds the following:

8               (1) Section 502B of the Foreign Assistance Act  
9       of 1961 mandates that no security assistance may

1 be provided to any country the government of which  
2 engages in a consistent pattern of gross violations of  
3 internationally recognized human rights.

4 (2) Section 523 of the Foreign Assistance Act  
5 of 1961 states that none of the funds appropriated  
6 or otherwise made available pursuant to this Act  
7 shall be obligated to finance indirectly any assistance  
8 or reparations to Cuba, Iraq, Libya, Iran, Syria,  
9 North Korea, or Sudan, unless the President of the  
10 United States certifies that the withholding of these  
11 funds is contrary to the national interest of the  
12 United States.

13 (3) Under the terms of Resolution 2043 of  
14 April 21, 2012, the United Nations Security Council  
15 established a United Nations Supervision Mission in  
16 Syria (UNSMIS), for an initial period of 90 days,  
17 under the command of a Chief Military Observer,  
18 comprising an initial deployment of up to 300 un-  
19 armed military observers as well as an appropriate  
20 civilian component to fulfill the following mandate:  
21 To monitor a cessation of armed violence in all its  
22 forms by all parties and to monitor and support the  
23 full implementation of the UNSMIS' six-point plan.

1           (4) On June 15, 2012, UNSMIS suspended its  
2           activities owing to an intensification of armed vio-  
3           lence across the country.

4           (5) On July 20, 2012, the Security Council ex-  
5           tended UNSMIS for a final period of 30 days. Ac-  
6           cording to Resolution 2059, the Council would only  
7           consider further extensions to the mission “in the  
8           event that the Secretary-General reports and the Se-  
9           curity Council confirms the cessation of the use of  
10          heavy weapons and a reduction in the level of vio-  
11          lence sufficient by all sides’” to allow UNSMIS to  
12          implement its mandate.

13          (6) As the conditions set by the Security Coun-  
14          cil had not been met, UNSMIS mandate ended at  
15          midnight on August 19, 2012.

16          (7) The al-Nusrah Front is designated by the  
17          Department of State as a Foreign Terrorist Organi-  
18          zation.

19   **SEC. 3. SENSE OF CONGRESS.**

20          It is the sense of Congress that—

21               (1) the Government of Syria should imme-  
22               diately cease the use of heavy weapons in population  
23               centers;

24               (2) all parties within Syria should bring about  
25               a cessation of armed violence in all its forms;

1           (3) the Secretary of State should continue to  
2       list Syria as a state sponsor of terrorism;

3           (4) in accordance with international law, the  
4       Government of Syria should immediately cease the  
5       use of chemical weapons; and

6           (5) if the President considers initiating military  
7       action, including imposition of a “no fly” zone or  
8       other military operations on Syrian territory, air-  
9       space, or waters—

10           (A) according to article I, section 8, of the  
11       United States Constitution, “The Congress  
12       shall have Power To declare War, grant Letters  
13       of Marque and Reprisal, and make Rules con-  
14       cerning Captures on Land and Water.”;

15           (B) according to the War Powers Resolu-  
16       tion, “The constitutional powers of the Presi-  
17       dent as Commander-in-Chief to introduce  
18       United States Armed Forces into hostilities, or  
19       into situations where imminent involvement in  
20       hostilities is clearly indicated by the cir-  
21       cumstances, are exercised only pursuant to (1)  
22       a declaration of war, (2) specific statutory au-  
23       thorization, or (3) a national emergency created  
24       by attack upon the United States, its territories  
25       or possessions, or its armed forces.”; and

1 (C) the President should adhere to the  
2 War Powers Resolution and obtain specific stat-  
3 utory authorization for the use of the United  
4 States Armed Forces in response to the war in  
5 Syria.

6 **SEC. 4. AUTHORIZATION OF ASSISTANCE TO CONDUCT**  
7 **MILITARY OR PARAMILITARY OPERATIONS IN**  
8 **SYRIA.**

9 (a) AUTHORIZATION.—Notwithstanding any other  
10 provision of law, no assistance of any kind may be pro-  
11 vided by any United States Government agency for the  
12 purpose, or which would have the effect, of promoting,  
13 augmenting, directly or indirectly, the capacity of any na-  
14 tion, group, organization, movement, or individual to con-  
15 duct military or paramilitary operations in Syria, unless  
16 and until Congress expressly authorizes such assistance by  
17 law enacted after the date of enactment of this section.

18 (b) EXCEPTION.—Subsection (a) does not apply to  
19 assistance that is solely provided for humanitarian pur-  
20 poses.
