A BILL

To create an independent advisory panel to comprehensively assess the management structure and capabilities related to the Department of Homeland Security and make recommendations to improve the efficiency and effectiveness of the management of the Department.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “DHS Accountability
5 Act of 2012”.

1 **SEC. 2. FINDINGS.**

2 Congress finds that the Subcommittee on Oversight,
3 Investigations, and Management of the Committee on
4 Homeland Security of the House of Representatives held
5 a series of four hearings related to the management of
6 the Department of Homeland Security. The key findings
7 from such hearings were the following:

8 (1) The Department of Homeland Security has
9 not prioritized the missions outlined in its key strategic
10 planning documents. This lack of prioritization
11 may hinder the Department's efforts to effectively
12 manage risks to the United States. Since 2003, the
13 Government Accountability Office designated the
14 transformation of the Department as high risk because
15 the Department had to transform 22 agencies—several with
16 major management challenges—into one department, and
17 failure to effectively address the Department's management
18 and mission risks could have serious consequences to United
19 States national and economic security. The Government
20 Accountability Office continues to designate the transformation
21 of the Department as high risk.

22 (2) The Department has considerable work
23 ahead to achieve actions and outcomes critical to addressing
24 persistent management challenges. For example, a significant
25 number of acquisition programs
26

1 proceeded without component or departmental ap-
2 proval of essential planning documents. These re-
3 views are important to ensure the success of an ac-
4 quisition program. The Department also continues
5 to face challenges implementing key human capital
6 initiatives. Integrating financial data essential to ef-
7 fectively managing the Department also remains a
8 challenge.

9 (3) Areas of duplicative effort have also been
10 identified within the Department. For example, some
11 Federal Government agencies are paying fees to the
12 Department's Federal Protective Service for facility
13 risk assessments that are not being performed, while
14 at the same time performing their own risk assess-
15 ments. The Department also lacks robust acquisition
16 practices in place to position programs for success.
17 Federal Government auditors questioned U.S. Cus-
18 toms and Border Protection's plan to secure the Ari-
19 zona border because the agency could not justify the
20 specific types, quantities, cost, and deployment loca-
21 tions of its surveillance technologies.

22 (4) Investigators continue to identify cases of
23 employee corruption within the Department. Inves-
24 tigations by the Department's Inspector General led
25 to over 400 arrests of employees in 2011. Examples

1 include Border Patrol agents accepting bribes, thefts
2 by airport screeners, and immigration officers
3 complicit in fraud. In addition, overall employee mo-
4 rale in the Department remains one of the lowest in
5 the Federal Government.

6 **SEC. 3. ESTABLISHMENT.**

7 There is established in the legislative branch an inde-
8 pendent advisory panel to—

9 (1) comprehensively assess the management
10 structure and capabilities related to the Department
11 of Homeland Security; and

12 (2) make recommendations to improve the effi-
13 ciency and effectiveness of the management of the
14 Department.

15 **SEC. 4. MEMBERSHIP.**

16 (a) IN GENERAL.—The independent advisory panel
17 (in this Act referred to as the “Panel”) established under
18 section 3 shall be composed of ten members as follows:

19 (1) Two members shall be appointed by the
20 Speaker of the House of Representatives, in coordi-
21 nation with the Chairman of the Committee on
22 Homeland Security of the House of Representatives.
23 Only one of such members may be from the same
24 political party as the Speaker of the House of Rep-
25 resentatives.

1 (2) Two members shall be appointed by the ma-
2 jority leader of the Senate, in coordination with the
3 Chairman of the Committee on Homeland Security
4 and Governmental Affairs of the Senate. Only one of
5 such members may be from the same political party
6 as the majority leader of the Senate.

7 (3) One member shall be appointed by the mi-
8 nority leader of the House of Representatives, in co-
9 ordination with the Ranking Minority Member of the
10 Committee on Homeland Security of the House of
11 Representatives.

12 (4) One member shall be appointed by the mi-
13 nority leader of the Senate, in coordination with the
14 Ranking Minority Member of the Committee on
15 Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs of the
16 Senate.

17 (5) Two members shall be appointed by the
18 President, in consultation with the Secretary of
19 Homeland Security. Only one of such members may
20 be from the same political party as the President.

21 (6) One member shall be the Comptroller Gen-
22 eral of the United States or the Comptroller Gen-
23 eral's designee from the Government Accountability
24 Office.

1 (7) One member shall be the Inspector General
2 of the Department of Homeland Security or Inspec-
3 tor General's designee from the Office of Inspector
4 General of the Department of Homeland Security.

5 (b) PROHIBITION.—Except as provided in subsection
6 (a), members of the Panel may not be current appointees
7 of the President's Administration or Members of Con-
8 gress, in order to ensure objectivity of the Panel's assess-
9 ments.

10 (c) DEADLINE FOR APPOINTMENTS.—All appoint-
11 ments to the Panel shall be made not later than 90 days
12 after the date of the enactment of this Act.

13 (d) CO-CHAIRMEN.—The Panel shall have two co-
14 chairmen, as follows:

15 (1) A co-chairman who shall be a member of
16 the Panel designated by the Speaker of the House
17 of Representatives.

18 (2) A co-chairman who shall be a member of
19 the Panel designated by the majority leader of the
20 Senate.

21 (e) VACANCY.—In the event of a vacancy on the
22 Panel, the individual appointed to fill the vacant seat shall
23 be—

24 (1) subject to paragraph (2), appointed by the
25 same officer (or the officer's successor) who made

1 the appointment to the seat when the Panel was
2 first established; or

3 (2) if the officer's successor is of a party other
4 than the party of the officer who made the initial
5 appointment when the Panel was first established,
6 chosen in consultation with the senior officers of the
7 House of Representatives and the Senate of the
8 party which is the party of the officer who made
9 such initial appointment.

10 (f) GOVERNMENT EMPLOYEES.—Members of the
11 Panel who are officers or employees of the Federal Gov-
12 ernment shall serve without additional pay (or benefits in
13 the nature of compensation) for service as a member of
14 the Panel.

15 (g) INITIAL MEETING.—The Panel shall meet and
16 begin the operations of the Panel not later than 60 days
17 after the appointment of all Panel members under sub-
18 section (a).

19 **SEC. 5. DUTIES.**

20 The Panel shall assess the current management
21 structure and capabilities of the Department of Homeland
22 Security, including examining the following:

23 (1) The efficiency and effectiveness of the man-
24 agement structure and capabilities, including the
25 policies, practices, and procedures, of the Depart-

1 ment of Homeland Security and its component agen-
2 cies in carrying out the management functions, such
3 as program acquisition, financial management, infor-
4 mation technology, human capital issues, perform-
5 ance measurement, and risk management efforts, re-
6 lated to homeland security.

7 (2) The extent to which unnecessary duplication
8 exists in such management structure and capabili-
9 ties, and how, if at all, such duplication negatively
10 affects the mission of protecting the United States.

11 (3) The extent to which management of key
12 homeland security missions is centralized under the
13 Department.

14 (4) Options, as appropriate, to reduce or elimi-
15 nate harmful waste and duplication of effort in the
16 Department.

17 (5) Measures to evaluate the Department's
18 progress in reducing and eliminating waste and du-
19 plication from its management structure and capa-
20 bilities.

21 **SEC. 6. POWERS AND AUTHORITIES.**

22 (a) HEARINGS AND EVIDENCE.—The Panel or, on
23 the authority of the Panel, any portion thereof, may, for
24 the purpose of carrying out this section—

1 (1) hold such hearings and sit and act at such
2 times and places, take such testimony, receive such
3 evidence, administer such oaths (provided that the
4 quorum for a hearing shall be two members of the
5 Panel); and

6 (2) subject to subsection (b), require by sub-
7 poena or otherwise provide for the attendance and
8 testimony of such witnesses and the production of
9 such books, records, correspondence, memoranda,
10 papers, and documents, as the Panel, or such por-
11 tion thereof, may determine advisable.

12 (b) SUBPOENAS.—

13 (1) ISSUANCE.—

14 (A) IN GENERAL.—A subpoena may be
15 issued under this subsection only—

16 (i) by the two co-chairmen; or

17 (ii) by the affirmative vote of six
18 members of the Panel.

19 (B) SIGNATURE.—Subpoenas issued under
20 this subsection may be—

21 (i) issued under the signature of the
22 two co-chairmen or any member designated
23 by a majority of the Panel; and

1 (ii) served by any person designated
2 by the two co-chairmen or by any member
3 designated by a majority of the Panel.

4 (2) ENFORCEMENT.—

5 (A) IN GENERAL.—In the case of contu-
6 macy or failure to obey a subpoena issued
7 under this subsection, the United States district
8 court for the judicial district in which the sub-
9 poenaed person resides, is served, or may be
10 found, or where the subpoena is returnable,
11 may issue an order requiring such person to
12 produce documentary or other evidence. Any
13 failure to obey the order of the court may be
14 punished by the court as contempt of that
15 court.

16 (B) ADDITIONAL ENFORCEMENT.—In the
17 case of any failure of any witness to comply
18 with any subpoena, the Panel may, by majority
19 vote, certify a statement of fact constituting
20 such failure to the appropriate United States
21 attorney, who may bring the matter before a
22 grand jury for its action, under the same statu-
23 tory authority and procedures as if the United
24 States attorney had received a certification
25 under sections 102 through 104 of the Revised

1 Statutes of the United States (2 U.S.C. 192
2 through 194).

3 (c) PERSONNEL.—

4 (1) IN GENERAL.—The Panel shall have the au-
5 thorities provided in section 3161 of title 5, United
6 States Code, and shall be subject to the conditions
7 specified in such section, except to the extent that
8 such conditions would be inconsistent with the re-
9 quirements of this section.

10 (2) COMPENSATION.—The co-chairmen, in ac-
11 cordance with rules agreed upon by the Panel, may
12 appoint and fix the compensation of a staff director
13 and such other personnel as may be necessary to en-
14 able the Panel to carry out its functions, without re-
15 gard to the provisions of title 5, United States Code,
16 governing appointments in the competitive service,
17 and without regard to the provisions of chapter 51
18 and subchapter III of chapter 53 of such title relat-
19 ing to classification and General Schedule pay rates,
20 except that no rate of pay fixed under this para-
21 graph may exceed the equivalent of that payable for
22 a position at level V of the Executive Schedule under
23 section 5316 of title 5, United States Code.

24 (3) DETAILEES.—Any employee of the Federal
25 Government may be detailed to the Panel without

1 reimbursement from the Panel, and such detailee
2 shall retain the rights, status, and privileges of the
3 employee's regular employment without interruption.

4 (4) EXPERT AND CONSULTANT SERVICES.—The
5 Panel is authorized to procure the services of experts
6 and consultants in accordance with section 3109 of
7 title 5, United States Code, but at rates not to ex-
8 ceed the daily rate paid a person occupying a posi-
9 tion at level IV of the Executive Schedule under sec-
10 tion 5315 of title 5, United States Code.

11 (5) VOLUNTEER SERVICES.—Notwithstanding
12 section 1342 of title 31, United States Code, the
13 Panel may accept and use voluntary and uncompen-
14 sated services as the Panel determines necessary.

15 (d) SECURITY CLEARANCES.—The appropriate de-
16 partments or agencies of the Federal Government shall co-
17 operate with the Panel in expeditiously providing to the
18 Panel members and staff appropriate security clearances
19 to the extent possible pursuant to existing procedures and
20 requirements, except that no person shall be provided with
21 access to classified information under this section without
22 the appropriate security clearances.

23 (e) CONTRACTING.—The Panel may, to such extent
24 and in such amounts as are provided in appropriation

1 Acts, enter into contracts to enable the Panel to carry out
2 its duties under this Act.

3 (f) POSTAL SERVICES.—The Panel may use the
4 United States mails in the same manner and under the
5 same conditions as departments and agencies of the
6 United States.

7 (g) SUPPORT SERVICES.—Upon request of the Panel,
8 the Administrator of General Services shall provide the
9 Panel, on a reimbursable basis, with the administrative
10 support services necessary for the Panel to carry out its
11 duties under this Act. Such administrative services may
12 include human resource management, budget, leasing, ac-
13 counting, and payroll services.

14 (h) RULES OF PROCEDURE.—The Panel may estab-
15 lish rules for the conduct of the Panel's business, if such
16 rules are not inconsistent with this Act or other applicable
17 law.

18 (i) NONAPPLICABILITY OF THE FEDERAL ADVISORY
19 COMMITTEE ACT.—The Federal Advisory Committee Act
20 (5 U.S.C. App.) shall not apply to the Panel.

21 (j) TERMINATION.—The Panel shall terminate on the
22 date that is 60 days after the date of the submission of
23 its final report.

1 **SEC. 7. REPORTS TO CONGRESS.**

2 (a) INTERIM REPORT.—Not later than one year after
3 the date of the appointment of all the members of the
4 Panel, the Panel shall submit to the Committee on Home-
5 land Security of the House of Representatives and the
6 Committee on Homeland Security and Governmental Af-
7 fairs of the Senate an interim report, including the results
8 and findings of the assessment and examination carried
9 out in accordance with section 5.

10 (b) OTHER REPORTS AND BRIEFINGS.—The Panel
11 may from time to time submit to the committees specified
12 in subsection (a) such other reports and briefings relating
13 to the assessment and examination carried out in accord-
14 ance with section 5 as the Panel considers appropriate.
15 Such committees may request information on the Panel's
16 progress as it conducts its work.

17 (c) FINAL REPORT.—Not later than two years after
18 the date of the appointment of all the members of the
19 Panel, the Panel shall submit to the committees specified
20 in subsection (a) a final report on the assessment and ex-
21 amination carried out in accordance with section 5. Such
22 final report shall—

- 23 (1) include the findings of the Panel;
- 24 (2) identify lessons learned related to homeland
- 25 security management issues; and

1 (3) include specific recommendations related
2 to—

3 (A) improving the efficiency and effective-
4 ness of the management structure and capabili-
5 ties, including the policies, practices, and proce-
6 dures, of the Department of Homeland Security
7 and its component agencies in carrying out the
8 Department's management functions and mis-
9 sion to protect the United States;

10 (B) reducing or eliminating unnecessary
11 duplication in the management structure and
12 capabilities of the Department and its compo-
13 nent agencies;

14 (C) options, as appropriate, to reduce or
15 eliminate harmful waste and duplication of ef-
16 fort in the Department; and

17 (D) developing measures to evaluate the
18 Department's progress in reducing and elimi-
19 nating waste and duplication from its manage-
20 ment structure and capabilities.

21 **SEC. 8. FUNDING AND RESOURCES.**

22 (a) **AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.**—There is
23 authorized to be appropriated \$5,000,000 to carry out this
24 Act.

1 (b) AVAILABILITY.—Amounts made available to the
2 Panel under this section shall remain available until the
3 termination of the Panel.

4 (c) TRAVEL EXPENSES.—A member of the Panel
5 shall serve without pay but shall be allowed travel ex-
6 penses, including per diem in lieu of subsistence, at rates
7 authorized for an employee of an agency under subchapter
8 I of chapter 57 of title 5, United States Code, while away
9 from the home or regular place of business of such mem-
10 ber in the performance of the duties of the Panel.
